Health News:

November begins the holiday season, a time to be with our families, give thanks and *eat*! But for Fido and Whiskers it's a different story.

A rare small scrap from the table is usually harmless. But at holiday time we generally eat lots of rich foods and desserts. And if you have a large gathering of people each sneaking a scrap to the dog or cat, it may result in serious gastric distress.

Generally, it is best to avoid giving your animal any table scraps. (We hope your guests will respect your wishes, too!) Signs to watch for are vomiting, diarrhea, and malaise. As always, bones are a no-no!

Keep in mind that most clinics are closed on the holidays, so preventing GI distress will also prevent you from incurring a large vet bill at an emergency hospital.

The cure for this is to get the cat eating again. In Puddy's case, she would not eat on her own, so a tube was inserted through her side into her stomach through which she had to be fed. Puddy did very well with this treatment. She would curl up on her mother's lap while the slow feeding process took place. Granted, Puddy is the rare case when a cat cooperates! Food volume was gradually increased until regular food could be added back into her diet. We are glad to report that today Puddy is a perfectly healthy cat!
